The workshop was attended by 50 teachers of psychology from several states and one from St. Petersburg, Russia.

Dr. Keith was also an invited participant in a national meeting on partnerships in psychology, a conference intended to foster relationships among university, two-year college, and high school psychology programs.

Patricia Kowalski and Annette Kujawski Taylor, Department of Psychology, presented a paper titled, "Misconceptions about Psychology: Strength of Belief Unrelated to Accuracy," at the 80th Annual Convention of the Western Psychological Association in Portland, OR, in April.

Dr. Kowalski and Dr. Taylor, with student Kristin Lenihan, presented a paper titled, "Motivation to Learn During the Freshman Year," at the 80th Annual Convention of the Western Psychological Association in Portland, OR, in April.

Mitch Malachowski, Department of Chemistry, became the Chair of the Chemistry Division of the Council on Undergraduate Research at CUR's national meeting held June 19-24 at the College of Wooster, OH. CUR is an organization of over 3,000 faculty and 325 institutions dedicated to collaborative faculty-student research at predominately undergraduate institutions. USD is an institutional member of CUR. Dr. Malachowski also presented a workshop with Mike Nelson, Dean of Sciences at the University of Wisconsin, La Crosse, on "Changing Campus Cultures to Assist in Institutionalizing Undergraduate Research."

Dr. Malachowski attended an NSF sponsored workshop on "Leading Socratic Discussions in the Undergraduate Classroom" held at the University of Washington, July 19-23.

Dan Moriarty, Department of Psychology, presented a paper titled, "Mexican Gray Wolves: Status Report and Challenges Facing the Captive Breeding Program," with P. Valentino at the 12th Annual North American Interagency Wolf Conference at Chico Hot Springs, MT, in April.

In July, Dr. Moriarty presented a status report on the California Wolf Center Mexican wolf program at the annual meetings of the Mexican Wolf Species Survival Plan in El Paso, TX.

Larry Perez, Assistant Director of Housing and Residence Life, and Julie Bays, Director of Alcohol and Drug Education, will co-chair the Substance Abuse Task Force for the Western Association of College and University Housing Officers beginning July, 2000.

Julie Bays was the recipient of the Order of Omega Commitment to Excellence 2000 Award. This award is presented annually to a faculty member, staff member, or administrator who the Greek students believe has been a supporter and advocate for Greek life.

Judy Rauner, Director of the Office for Community Service-Learning and Nicole Rooney, USD student (now alumna), along with service-learning director/student teams from two other Universities, presented a workshop on "Reciprocal Enrichment: Service-Learning and Student Leadership Development" at the Third Annual Continuums of Service Conference, April 12-14, at the University of Washington in Seattle. A workshop summary will be published in the Continuums of Service Conference Proceedings, "Relationships, Responsibility, and Rigor: Service-Learning in the New Century."

Dr. Rauner, Joe Larson, USD student, and Emalyn Leppard, USD graduate and community partner with the Linda Vista Leaders program, presented a panel and workshop at "Taking Service-Learning to the Next Level Through Sustainable Partnerships," May 22-24, in Washington, D.C.

Daniel Sheehan, Department of Physics, presented a paper at the 8th Workshop on The Physics of Dusty Plasmas in Santa Fe, NM. His paper, entitled, "Low-g Experiments with UV-Photoionized Dust," described dusty plasma experiments conducted with four UCSD students aboard NASA's KC-135A "Vomit Comet" aircraft whose parabolic dives allow near zero-gravity experiments. These experiments are the first in an anticipated series of experiments aboard the KC-135 aimed at producing the predicted, but experimentally elusive, "three-dimensional plasma crystal."

Sandra Sgoutas-Emch, Department of Psychology, presented a paper titled, "Designing a Health Fair with the Community: A Service-Learning Project for Health Psychology," at the 80th Annual Convention of the Western Psychological Association in Portland, OR, in April.

Dr. Sgoutas-Emch also presented a paper titled, "College Students and Alternative Medicine: Do Beliefs and Knowledge Lead to Usage?" with B. Bautista and A. Schultz at the 80th Annual Convention of the Western Psychological Association in Portland, OR, in April.

In May, Dr. Sgoutas-Emch and a team of USD health psychology students received the Exemplary Partnership Award at the San Diego schools 18th annual End-of-Year Community Recognition Event, for their work with Twain High School.

Mary M. Williams, School of Education, published an article in Education International entitled, "A Framework for Teaching Values and Ethics," in June. The article appeared in three different language versions of the journal (Spanish, French, English) that was distributed to 23.7 million educators internationally.

Dr. Williams gave a keynote presentation at "The First Annual Institute Achieving Social Responsibility Through... Character Education, Law-related Education, Service Learning, and Conflict Resolution" in Orlando, FL, in June.

"Character Education: A Review of Theoretical Frameworks," a three-hour presentation, was given by Dr. Williams at the Association of Moral Education's Annual Conference in Glasgow, Scotland, in July.

Dr. Williams and **Edward F. DeRoche**, also of the School of Education, wrote the book FORWARD to Diane Brooks, (2000) "Readings and Activities for Character Education: A Resource Guide for Teachers and Students Upper Elementary and Middle Grades." (Peterborough, NH: Cobblestone Publishing Co)

Dr. Williams and Dr. DeRoche hosted the 2nd International Conference and Academy on Character Education at USD's Division of Continuing Education in June.
