After the Dedication — The SLP One Year Later

After the ceremonial ribbons were cut and the last echo of inspiring speeches faded into the breeze, Cold War Kids took the stage on the Plaza Mayor for a once-in-a-lifetime concert open only to Toreros. The Student Life Pavilion reverberated with an exhilaration that's inevitable when you mix a crowd of ecstatic students and the thrill of something new with a kick drum, a bass guitar and a gigantic amp.

That was Sept. 24, 2009. Today, the three-story, 50,000-square-foot Student Life Pavilion is still filled with a buzz that can be seen, heard and felt.

The Student Life Pavilion truly is the place where students gather to eat, meet, study and hang out. The first floor is home to Pavilion dining, where chefs work at live-action cooking stations preparing Spanish, Latin, Chinese, Japanese, Vietnamese, Italian and classic American cuisines. The second floor features Tu Mercado. It's a combination grocery store, deli, culinary workshop and spirit shop where students can stock their pantries, shop for Torero gear, pick up a prepared meal or order a gelato. The third floor is where students make things happen. It's where you can find Associated Students, Greek Life and other student organizations. It's also where students are busy working on the Vista student newspaper, USD Radio, USDtv and the yearbook.



Sustainability at the SLP

Going for the Gold, While Keeping it Green



The Student Life Pavilion is seeking to earn the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) gold certification — the highest rating that can be bestowed on a commercial building in the United States.

Here are just some of the SLP's innovative and environmentally friendly features:

- An innovative decomposition unit that breaks food waste into water, which will allow USD to reduce its food waste by up to 40 percent, and cut its CO2 and greenhouse gas emissions
- A tray-less dining system that last year led to approximately \$400,000 in savings on wasted food
- Fixtures that reduce water consumption by 20-30 percent



- A rooftop herb and vegetable garden that not only yields award-winning produce, but also helps insulate the building and prevent excessive rainwater run-off


What Did We Do Without This Place?
