The conference will draw leading philosophers, theologians, and historians from across Europe and the Americas to address the historical and theoretical challenges of understanding the sacrament of the Eucharist, a central mystery of the Catholic faith. The conference is meant to address both the metaphysical issues involved in the sacrament and the theological developments that played out first in the medieval schools and later in early-modern religious schisms, leading to the paradigm shift from medieval to modern forms of thought. Presenting in Budapest will be a wonderful opportunity for me to share my research, receive expert feedback from specialists in my field, and forge new professional relationships with other medievalists throughout the world. |
