The plant communities of the El Socorro Dunes' flora were surveyed over 11 years ago and prioritized as an international conservation region. This project will re-survey the dunes to understand how plant communities have shifted in the past decade. Because goat farmers allow herds to graze on the dunes, we additionally seek to determine if and how goat grazing may have influenced any identified changes. Finally, we will use the data generated to examine how regulation or community understanding may positively impact the dune's conservation status.
