I would like to pursue more research in other communities to understand what I call, "adaptive migration" patterns in other communities impacted by the typhoon hence I would like to meet with professors at the University of the Philippines, Visayas. Adaptive migration is where families split up to use two houses to slowly adapt to a new way of life in a new home in a safer location provided free of charge by the government and use their original home to maintain their livelihoods. By using two homes they are slowly adapting to migration because the ultimate goal is to move people away from hazard prone areas to safer ones thereby reducing their risks and saving lives. By presenting my findings and meeting with researchers in the Philippines, I hope to conduct more research there and expand our knowledge of disaster and climate mitigation actions.

The goal of this research is to address questions about the domestication of dogs from wolves during the Upper Paleolithic through a study of gnawing marks on prey bones from the site. The timing of this domestication event is contentious (approximately 27,000 – 41,500 BP), but it represents an important shift in human behavioral ecology. Funding will be used for expenses related to my travel to Brno, Czech Republic for one week over Spring Break.
