Choosing classes may feel overwhelming, but never fear! The Office for Law Student Affairs is here to help. Prior to meeting with an Academic Advisor in Law Student Affairs, we ask that you do the following:

Answer these two questions:

- What is your professional goal once you graduate from USD?
- What has been the most interesting subject you have studied while in law school?

You can also search specifically for upper division writing and experiential courses by clicking on "Advanced Search" and using the attribute field to indicate "Law Upper Division Writing" or "Experiential."
