Using Character Quotes in the Classroom

Quotations are often a time-effective instructional strategy to engage your students to "think about thinking" (meta-cognition). Quotes lend themselves to critical thinking, application to lessons in life, a conversation starter for home and classrooms, and a character/behavior guide.

In addition, quotes meet Common Core State Standards for ELA-Literacy.CCRA.R2, CCRA.R8, CCRA.R9 (<u>Mensa Education & Research Foundation</u>) To You Their Teacher: It's up to YOU to answer four questions about this lesson: (1) Do you want to use it? (2) If so, do you need to modify it? (3) How much time will you give it? (4) How will it be extended?

Objectives: After this lesson students will be able to answer these questions:

- What do you think of when you read/hear this quote?
- What do you think the author was thinking?
- How would you write, journal, and/or do artwork (poster, painting, mural) for the quote you selected?

Presidents' Day is an American holiday celebrated on the third Monday in February-this year, February 19, 2018. Originally established in 1885 in recognition of President George Washington, it is still unofficially called "Washington's Birthday" by many. The holiday became known as Presidents' Day after it was moved as part of 1971's Uniform Monday Holiday Act, an attempt to create more three-day weekends for the nation's workers. Several states still have individual holidays honoring the birthdays of Washington, Abraham Lincoln, and other figures.
