CASEL: Educating Hearts-Inspiring Minds: The Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning is the "world's leading organization, promoting ASEL for all children in preschool through high school. Students exposed to SEL in school continue to do better than their peers on a number of indicators: positive social behaviors and attitudes, skills such as empathy and teamwork, and academics. And they have fewer conduct problems, less emotional distress, and lower drug use, among many other benefits."

SECOND STEP: The Second Step Program is one of several educational programs developed by Committee for Children. The program is used in over 25,000 classrooms in the United States, Canada, and 26 other countries. For example, in the Anaheim Elementary School District, the program was the catalyst for a district-wide cultural shift around social-emotional health. Staff recognized the huge role it plays in classroom readiness and the positive impact it can have on academic success.
