Two Things to Think About

The difference between a vocation and a career:

A career is something you choose; a vocation is something you are called to ... A career is a job you do as long as the benefits outweigh the cost; a vocation involves falling in love with something, having a conviction about it and making it part of your personal identity. A person choosing a career asks, How can I get the best job? A person summoned by a vocation asks, How can my existing abilities be put in service of the greatest common good? The difference between personality and character:

Personality is easy to read, and we're all experts at it. We judge people...if not upon first meeting them, then shortly thereafter. Character, on the other hand, takes far longer to puzzle out. It includes traits that reveal themselves only in specific—and often uncommon—circumstances, traits like honesty, virtue, and kindliness.

Ironically, research has shown that personality traits are determined largely by heredity and are mostly immutable. The arguably more important traits of character, on the other hand, are more malleable—though, we should note, not without great effort. Character traits, as opposed to personality traits, are based on beliefs (e.g., that honesty and treating others well is important—or not), and though beliefs can be changed, it's far harder than most realize.
